GALANG in 2016: A Catalyst for Empowerment

2016 was a rollercoaster of a year. And even though the road to equality was littered with sexist remarks and discriminatory statements from politicians, tragic news of young LGBT people taking their own lives, and devastating attacks that cost the lives of our LGBT brothers and sisters, **we at GALANG remain steadfast, striving to keep ourselves rooted deeply within our vision of a just and progressive society, and to continue carrying on our mission to become a catalyst for the empowerment of Filipino lesbians, bisexual women, and trans men (LBTs) living in urban poor communities.**

The highlights for the year 2016 are the **legislative progress of the Anti-Discrimination Bill (ADB), strengthening and forging of new partnerships with government and non-government allies, continuing engagements with international partners, and starting initiatives that focus on improving the well-being of LBTs through comprehensive sexuality education and family acceptance.**

Before being passed at the Third Mother Committee session of the Women and Gender Equality Committee of the House of Representatives in October, **we were honored to witness the first Senate hearing**

of the Sexual Orientation, Gender Identity and Expression (SOGIE)-based Anti-Discrimination Bill (Senate Bill No. 935). Now called the SOGIE Equality Bill, it has also garnered more co-authors or “Equality Champions,” raising its chances of being signed into law during the 17th Congress after languishing in the Philippine Congress for almost two decades now.

We also participated in international conferences to share how we use feminist approaches in our evidence-based advocacy work, and how these approaches can be incorporated with the Sustainable Development Goals in addressing issues of women on bodily integrity and ideological barriers towards equality and development. In another conference, we also had the opportunity to reconnect with fellow feminists from international organizations, and exchange ideas and strategies on advancing women’s rights.

With our strategic participation in key regional workshops, we were able to **resonate the realities of our community-based partners, which include lack of access and awareness of sexual and reproductive health and rights.** In January, we participated in a meeting in Penang, Malaysia to **strategize for more effective youth participation in the global sexual and reproductive health and rights movement.** Later in June, we also attended a 3-day regional workshop in Kuala Lumpur where 15 NGOs across 11 Asian

countries talked about advocacy work on youth and comprehensive sexuality education (CSE) in their respective countries.

As part of our commitment to empower our partner LBT people's organizations in the community, **we have started conducting a series of capacity-building activities to raise awareness on CSE and sexual and reproductive health and rights, specific to the needs of LBTs in urban poor communities. Here, we emphasized the importance of taking care of one's sexual and reproductive health and rights in improving their overall well-being.**

This was also a year of forging new partnerships to help bridge the economic gap experienced by our partners in the community. In October, we signed a memorandum of understanding (MOU) with the Technical Education and Skills Development Authority-Women's Center (TESDA-WC). This MOU endeavors to **provide opportunities for gainful employment of LBTs by enrolling and developing their skills in TESDA-WC's competency-based training programs.** As part of the MOU, we also conducted a SOGIE orientation to TESDA-WC employees in November to **highlight the importance of preventing SOGIE-based discrimination and harassment in the workplace.**

We also launched our Family Acceptance and Diversity project, which consists of a series of capacity-building workshops aimed to broaden the base of support for equal rights and to mainstream SOGIE at the household and local government levels. Most of the participants were families and friends of our partner LBT people's organizations. **The workshops highlighted the important role of family acceptance in enhancing the well-being of LBTs, and encouraging them to become productive members of the community.**

As you leaf through the pages of this newsletter, we hope that you feel every ounce of pride we felt while making this. **Our achievements the past year won't be possible without your unwavering support, and the admirable dedication of our staff, partner LBT people's organizations, fellow civil society organizations, allies, networks, friends, and families. We are truly grateful for the support you have given us, and we will continue to do our best in the work that we do.**




Early in 2016, Sen. Manny Pacquiao, who was at the time a member of the Philippine House of Representatives, released a hateful statement describing LGBTs as “*masahol pa sa hayop*” (lower than beasts). The derogatory nature of this remark served as inspiration for GALANG to join activities aimed at raising awareness on the plight of Filipino LGBTs.

In April, GALANG marched alongside advocates and allies during LAGABLAB’s Roar Your Vote march, **amplifying the call for LGBT inclusion in the political platforms of the 2016 election candidates.**

A few days later, GALANG held a voters education workshop for its partner LPOs. This educational discussion aimed to **deepen the LPOs’ understanding of the electorate of the Philippine democracy and traditional political culture, as well as their participative roles as Filipino citizens in the 2016 elections.**



In September, GALANG joined fellow LGBT advocates, friends, supporters, students, and partner organizations at the 2016 University of the Philippines (UP) Pride March at the UP Diliman Academic Oval. To resonate with the March's theme, "Live for Love," GALANG once again affirmed love of self and country.

Three months later, GALANG travelled to the bustling City of Pines to join the 10th Baguio Pride Parade. Hundreds of LGBT organizations, allies, and students marched along Session Road and Magsaysay Avenue, "Celebrating a Decade that is #AllForLoveAndPride." At the post-march program, GALANG Advocacy Program Head Gyky Tangente amplified the call for the **passage of the Anti-Discrimination Bill, and highlighted the important role of families, friends, and allies in promoting the well-being of LGBTs.**

In June, a tragedy shook Orlando, Florida when a shooting took place at a gay nightclub, killing 49 LGBTs. The shooting wounded not only the bereaved families and friends of the victims, it devastated the entire global LGBT community.

GALANG joined fellow LGBT advocates and organizations at Vinzon's Hall, UP Diliman, as they lighted candles and prayed for the victims of the Orlando shooting massacre. **Advocacy Program Head Gyky Tangente emphasized that GALANG's rainbow flag remains steadfast in its commitment to fight for love and equality.**

A few days later, GALANG with over 80 members of our partner LPOs, families, and friends from urban poor communities joined the Metro Manila Pride March. GALANG fears not only for the safety of its partners in the community but also for every LGBT living under threat of violence and discrimination. Hence, GALANG waved its banner and sounded its clarion call: "*Karapatang Pinaghirapan, Patuloy na Ipaglaban*" (Let's Keep Fighting for Our Hard-won Rights) The event served as an opportune moment to draw attention to the **urgency and importance of actively promoting and protecting human rights, and to call for unity in the fight to end discrimination and violence.**

To complement GALANG's advocacy work on equality, the organization has strategically participated in key regional workshops in 2016 to **resonate the realities of its community-based partners, which include lack of access and awareness to sexual and reproductive health services.**

In January, GALANG Advocacy Program Head Gyky Tangente participated in a meeting in Penang, Malaysia. Organized by the Asian Pacific Resource and Research Centre for Women (ARROW), the meeting brought together partner non-government and civil society organizations to **strategize for more effective youth participation in the global sexual and reproductive health and rights movement.**

Later in June, Ms. Tangente and GALANG Research Program Head Lynx Hufancia attended a 3-day regional workshop in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia. ARROW invited 15 NGO partners from 11 Asian countries, one of which is the Philippines, to talk about youth issues and advocacy work on comprehensive sexuality education (CSE) in their respective countries.

As part of GALANG's commitment to the empowerment of its partner LPOs, GALANG started conducting discussions on CSE, as echoed from the international engagements mentioned. In September, GALANG held a workshop on CSE, with participants from GALANG's four partner LPOs as the participants. The workshop **highlighted sexual and reproductive health and rights specific to the needs of LBTs, and its significance towards improving one's overall well-being.**

Many LBTs experience rejection and abuse (verbal, physical, emotional, and psychological violence) at the hands of their families. These experiences lead to poor self-esteem, and in many cases, even self-destructive behaviors. **In order to address this, GALANG launched the Family Acceptance and Diversity (FAD) Initiative**, consisting mainly of capacity-building activities designed for friends and families of members of its partner LPOs—Lesbian Alliance Movement (LAM), Lesbians Organization against Violence and Inequality (LOVE), Ugnayan ng Nagkakaisang Lesbyana Laban sa Diskriminasyon (UNLAD), and Lesbians For Rights (LFR).

In September, GALANG started a series of training sessions designed to capacitate families and friends in a wide range of topics, from basic concepts on sexual orientation, gender identity and expression (SOGIE) to ways on how to support the overall well-being of LBTs.

These training sessions aim to **prepare the participants in forming concrete action plans to further support LBTs** in their respective barangays. Forming of action plans will take place in early 2017, under Module 4 of the FAD training sessions.

Before 2016 ended, GALANG held a Christmas party that brought together partner LPOs and their families and friends. This event provided an opportunity for families and friends to exchange messages of support and solidarity. **GALANG Executive Director Anne Lim** took the opportunity to laud the efforts of the families and friends in supporting and opening their hearts and minds to the plight of LBTs in their communities.

GALANG—together with fellow LGBT and human rights advocates—continues to actively fight for the passage of the Anti-Discrimination Bill (ADB) by attending consultations and hearings held at the Senate, and the House of Representatives.

In August 2016, the first Senate hearing for the SOGIE-based ADB took place. During this hearing, GALANG Deputy Executive Director Maroz Ramos served as resource person and shared how urban poor LBTs are systematically excluded from government programs and services that favor heterosexual beneficiaries. This reality further aggravates the marginalization experienced by LGBT people in terms of education, subsidized housing, food, healthcare, and employment opportunities.

Later in September, GALANG—together with members of its partner LPOs and fellow LGBT advocates—witnessed the first privilege speech of the first trans woman, First District of Bataan Representative Geraldine B. Roman to be elected into the House of Representatives.

In October, the Third Mother Committee Hearing of the Committee on Women and Gender Equality (CWGE) took place at the House of Representatives. Here, Ms. Ramos shared comments and inputs on the 10 legislative proposals aimed at prohibiting and penalizing SOGIE-based discrimination.

Before the year ended, the Anti-Discrimination Bill, now named the SOGIE Equality Bill, was passed by the CWGE at the Lower House. This recent development gave hope to the LGBT advocacy that after 17 years of persistent lobbying, LGBT people's right to freedom from discrimination and violence may soon be recognized by the Philippine government.




Among the challenges faced by LBTs living in urban poor communities are limited access to job opportunities, and lack of qualifications for employment. **GALANG aims to address this gap by signing a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with the Technical Education and Skills Development Authority - Women's Center (TESDA-WC)** —the country's lead agency committed to creating a gender-responsive enabling environment for the economic empowerment of women regardless of SOGIE.

The MOU endeavors to provide opportunities for gainful employment of LBTs by enrolling and developing their skills in TESDA-WC's competency-based training programs.

As part of the MOU, **GALANG conducted a two-day training with TESDA-WC employees in which trainers and non-teaching personnel learned about SOGIE and identified measures that would prevent SOGIE-based discrimination in the workplace.** GALANG Advocacy Program Head Gyky Tangente covered topics on sexuality and SOGIE, while Deputy Executive Director Maroz Ramos discussed about gender biases and discrimination, and how policies in the workplace can help address such cases.

GALANG seizes every opportunity to share with the world the realities of urban poor Filipino LBTs, and to amplify SOGIE-based issues in the Philippines.

GALANG shared its evidence-based advocacy work with over 50 feminist activists from the Global South in ARROW's regional strategizing meeting on July 2016. Other points of discussion were inputs on how the **Sustainable Development Goals can be adopted with a feminist approach, issues on bodily integrity, voices of women, and ideological barriers to equality and development.** GALANG Project Officer Ingrid Saplagio talked about GALANG's definition of feminism in its ethical practices and values, and how it pushes the advocacy further.

Later in September, GALANG Executive Director Anne Lim joined partner organizations Astraea Lesbian Foundation for Justice and Mama Cash in the 13th International Forum of the Association for Women's Rights in Development in Costa do Sauipe, Bahia, Brazil. The forum's theme, "Feminist Futures: Building Collective Power for Rights and Justice," **encouraged the participants to share their current realities, and the direction their institutions and mechanisms are currently pursuing towards the advancement of women's rights.**

These engagements with international partners serve **as key opportunities for sharing GALANG's work, as well as the organization's active role in the larger battle towards acceptance and equal rights of LGBTs.**

Across the globe, governments have committed to international legal obligations to promote and develop the right of every person to enjoy access to life and education without exclusion and discrimination. However, environments around young people are not always inclusive, let alone safe and free from different forms of violence and discrimination. **GALANG took steps this year to raise the awareness of child's rights advocates, as well as select LGBT youth on basic SOGIE concepts, and how it intersects with human rights.**

GALANG conducted two learning sessions with child's rights advocates aimed at raising awareness on basic SOGIE concepts, and how SOGIE-based discrimination is detrimental to a child's development and growth. Both sessions were done in partnership with the ASEAN SOGIE Caucus (ASC) and the Philippine NGO Coalition on the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child.

Later in July, GALANG conducted a three-day workshop in Baguio City to young LGBT individuals from various organizations based in Northern and Central Luzon, and Cordillera Administrative Region. This workshop consisted of sessions on SOGIE, human rights, leadership, empowerment, and self-care which were facilitated by Ging Cristobal of OutRight Action International, Ryan Silverio of ASC, and Jan Castañeda of the Psychological Association of the Philippines' LGBT Special Interest Group. Once again, GALANG has partnered with ASC for this workshop, and with support from the United States Embassy.

GALANG began the year by orienting employees, focal persons, and staff from local and national government agencies; discussing concepts on SOGIE, and its relevance to existing national and local policies. In January, GALANG Deputy Executive Director Maroz Ramos and Research Component Head Lynx Hufancia oriented 420 elementary and high school educators under the Department of Education in Quezon City. The next month, they flew to Davao City to orient 40-45 investigators, employees, and focal persons from the Visayas and Mindanao offices of the Commission on Human Rights.

In August, GALANG engaged with participants from the Department of Education, Philippine Commission on Women, and various civil society organizations working on child and LGBT rights during the National Consultation on Sexual Orientation, Gender Identity and Expression (SOGIE)-based Bullying in the Philippine Education Setting. **As one of the panelists, Ms. Ramos talked about GALANG's programs and services that address SOGIE-based bullying and other school-related gender-based violence. On the other hand, Ms. Hufancia shared inputs on awareness-raising and capacity-building activities; policy advocacy and school curriculum; and research agenda and documentation of best practices, among others.**

In November, GALANG pushed for inclusion of marginalized groups in the government's system by participating in the workshop entitled "Multi-Sectoral Rapid Assessment on the Pillars of Justice's Capacity to Handle Gender-Related Offenses." Ms. Ramos served as a facilitator during one of the group discussions, while Advocacy Program Head Gyky Tangente joined other groups and organizations in assessing the capacities of main government institutions in handling gender-related offenses.





GALANG expanded its advocacy reach from government agencies, partner non-government and civil society organizations to private institutions—encouraging private companies and businesses to mainstream workplace equality.

As part of the MOU with the QC Public Employment Service Office to sustain and strengthen efforts in promoting workplace equality, GALANG conducted an orientation to about 60 CMI Matrix Company employees in May, in compliance with the Quezon City Gender-Fair Ordinance. Here, the affirmative and prohibitive acts of the said ordinance were discussed focusing on the employment section.

Later in November, 20 employees and managers of Ching Bee Trading Corporation—an abaca trading company in Quezon City with various offices in Davao City, Leyte, Albay, and Catanduanes—were oriented on SOGIE-based workplace discrimination. Research Component Head Lynx Hufancia served as resource person and also discussed the key provisions from existing non-discriminatory ordinances with jurisdiction to the areas of operations of the company.

In addition to capacity building activities and advocacy work, **GALANG** also actively seeks out opportunities to sustain and strengthen partnerships with organizations that also strive to address gender-based violence, stigma, and discrimination.

In celebration of the National Women's Month and International Women's Day in the Philippines, **GALANG** participated in a follow-up activity with UN Women's Safe Cities Program in March. Around 20 members of GALANG's partner LPOs participated in the workshop which aimed to monitor action plan results from the previous workshops to aid in building the advocacy capacities of community-based organizations. **UN Women** also presented the first-ever national data on sexual harassment in public spaces, which further motivated the LPOs to commit to their respective action plans to put an end to street harassment.

Come November, GALANG representatives presented at the 3rd National Facilitator's Training Workshop on Conducting LGBT Psych 101. Organized by the Psychological Association of the Philippines, this workshop designed to build a pool of Filipino counselors and psychologists to educate the public on learning sessions called "LGBT Psych 101." **GALANG** Advocacy Program Head Gyky Tangente and Research Component Head Lynx Hufancia discussed the intersections of stigma and discrimination directed at the LGBT sector under the Philippine context. **The presentations illustrated the realities of the negative impacts of interpersonal and institutional stigma and discrimination.**
